2008 Community Health Assessment (CHA) Beginnings

- October 2007 Data-Sharing Meetings
 - Over 30 stakeholders participated
 - Requested a new CHA
- Previous assessment was completed in 2004
- Data silos, time lag in published data
- Needed the most current assessment of the county's 'health'

2008 Community Health Assessment (CHA) Beginnings

- Public Health CAPE unit coordinated the CHA, with funding from nine agencies
- Using the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnership (MAPP) infrastructure

2008 Community Health Assessment (CHA) – Process, Results

- Selected over 70 indicators
 - Behavioral, social, economic, health
 - Face-to-face survey and Secondary Data
 - 24 Partners assisted and collected over 3000 surveys (2815)

Moving Data to Action

- Major findings were categorized into ***broad determinants of health***
- 1. Access to Care
- 2. Education
- 3. Basic Needs
- 4. Built Environment

Data to Action - Workshops

- Jan 22, 2009: the first stakeholder Data to Action Workshop
- Stakeholders requested additional half-day follow-up workshops on each broad determinant



During the Workshops....

- Stakeholders agreed on the Goals and Focus Areas for the Broad Determinant of Health
- Identified current activities being done towards accomplishing the goals
- Identified potential strategies / activities as well

Focus Areas

- **Access to Care** – addressing uninsured, provider shortage, coordination of care and consumer education / empowerment
- **Education** – addressing drop out rates, truancy, life skills training, workforce readiness, promotion of healthy behaviors in schools

Focus Areas

- Basic Needs – addressing hunger, limited food choices, housing and shelter, child care shortage, development / maintenance of self sufficiency skills, worker retraining
- Built Environment – to be determined in today's meeting

After the Workshops....

- Public Health CAPE unit garnered key lead agency support for different focus areas
- Completed Basic Needs Gap Analysis
- Using data from the CHA, brainstorm session ideas from the workshops, developed framework for Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

- Overall goal: to improve health in Stanislaus
- By facilitating partnerships, information sharing and developing strategies
- Implement the health improvement strategies to address priority focus areas

CHIP Time Line

- Writing CHIP (now to Dec 09)
- CHIP Draft Released (Jan 2010)
- CHIP Finalized (Feb – Mar 2010)
- Debuts (April 2010)
- **Implementation (May 2010 to 2013)**
